
COLLABORATORY: UW TACOMA'S COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT DATABASE



July 1, 2023 - June 30, 2024




What Happened at UWT in the last 5 years?


July 1, 2019 - June 30, 2024





Who were this year's partners?



























EMPOWERING STUDENTS THROUGH COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Type of Student Involvement 2023-2024



This graphic shows the distribution of student engagement hours across curricular and co-curricular activities over the past 5 years, 2019-2024. It highlights the contribution of 1,291 students, who collectively dedicated 9,061 hours to community-focused initiatives, with 6,578 hours attributed to course-based (curricular) activities and 2,483 hours to extracurricular (co-curricular) endeavors.

These graphics represent data which is self-reported into Collaboratory by UW Tacoma faculty and staff. It does not represent all student-related community engagement at UW Tacoma. Student counts in course-based activities are reported on a section-by-section basis and are not deduplicated. Collaboratory does not track individual student data.

CARNEGIE FOUNDATION: ELECTIVE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT CLASSIFICATION

Since receiving the Carnegie Classification for Community Engagement in December of 2019, UW Tacoma faculty, staff, and students remain focused on making community engagement a deeper, more pervasive, better integrated, and sustained campus effort.

This year, UW Tacoma is working on the reapplication process for the Carnegie Community Engagement Classification designation (due in Spring of 2025).



HOW DOES CARNEGIE DEFINE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT?

"Community engagement describes collaboration between institutions of higher education and their larger communities (local, regional/state, national, global) for the mutually beneficial exchange of knowledge and resources in a context of partnership and reciprocity.

The purpose of community engagement is the partnership of college and university knowledge and resources with those of the public and private sectors to enrich scholarship, research, and creative activity; enhance curriculum, teaching and learning; prepare educated, engaged citizens; strengthen democratic values and civic responsibility; address critical societal issues; and contribute to the public good."

FELLOWSHIPS, AWARDS AND RECOGNITION

The University of Washington Tacoma recognizes and celebrates community engagement through a variety of awards and observances. Many faculty, staff, and students on this campus are engaged in exciting community partnership activities, and recognizing their work is a priority.

DISTINGUISHED COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AWARD

Given annually, the award recognizes the important and innovative community-engaged and community-based work by faculty at the University of Washington Tacoma.
